## Grammar Explanations

## Examples

1. As you learned in Unit 73, when the **reporting verb** is in the **simple past tense**, in the indirect speech statement the **verb tense often changes**.

**Modals often change** in indirect speech too.

DIRECT SPEECH		INDIRECT SPEECH
will	→	<b>would</b>
can	→	<b>could</b>
may	→	<b>might</b>
must	→	<b>had to</b>

**DIRECT SPEECH**  
She said,  
"It's windy."

**INDIRECT SPEECH**  
She said  
it **was** windy.

**DIRECT SPEECH**  
I said, "The winds  
**will be** strong."

**INDIRECT SPEECH**  
I said the winds  
**would be** strong.

They told us, "You  
**can stay** with us."

They told us we  
**could stay** with them.

He said, "The storm  
**may last** all night."

He said that the storm  
**might last** all night.

She told us,  
"You **must leave**."

She told us  
we **had to leave**.

2. **Some verbs do not change** in indirect speech.

- Do not change **should, could, might**, and **ought to** in indirect speech.
- Do not change the **past perfect** in indirect speech.
- Do not change verbs in **present and past unreal conditional** sentences in indirect speech.
- Do not change **past modals** in indirect speech.

**DIRECT SPEECH**  
"You **should listen**  
to the weather  
report," he told us.

**INDIRECT SPEECH**  
He told us that we  
**should listen** to  
the weather report.

"I **had just moved**  
here a week before,"  
she said.

She said she  
**had just moved** there  
a week before.

"If I **knew**,  
I **would tell** you."

Jim said if he **knew**,  
he **would tell** me.

"If I **had known**,  
I **would have told**  
you," said Jim.

He said if he  
**had known**, he  
**would have told** me.

"I **should have**  
**left**."

He said that he  
**should have left**.

3. **REMEMBER!** Change pronouns, time phrases, **here**, and **this** in indirect speech to **keep the speaker's original meaning**.

■ "I just got **here yesterday**."

■ Sam told me **he** had just gotten **there the day before**.
